As part of your A Level History course, you will study the history of Russia in the period 1855-1964.

The first half of the unit covers the reigns of the last three Tsars, Alexander II, Alexander III and Nicholas II. This section culminates with the two revolutions in 1917 which result in the fall of tsars and the emergence of a Communist dictatorship.

The second half of the unit covers life in Russia under the Communist regimes of Lenin. Stalin and Khrushchev.


Throughout this unit we consider six key questions.

How was Russia governed and how did political authority change and develop?

- Why did opposition develop and how effective was it?
- How and with what results did the **economy** develop and change?
- What was the extent of social and cultural change?
- How important were ideas and ideology?
- How important was the role of **individuals** and **groups** and how were they affected by developments?
- \*\*As you introduce yourself to the period using the resources below, you should keep the broad themes of these questions in mind. \*\*

For a good skim of the period, you could either listen or read Rupert Colley's The Russian Revolution (History in one Hour series)


## Unit 2B - Wars of the Roses 1450-1499

This option provides for the study-in-depth of a period of turbulence in British history, during which the authority of the monarch was questioned and the relationship between Church, State and the baronage was readjusted. It develops concepts such as authority, dynastic ambition and rebellion and encourages students to reflect on issues such as territorial integrity and what makes a 'state'.


Alison Weir - Lancaster and York
