I hope you enjoy reading this edition of the Newsletter. This was the final event of our Science Week, which also included all of our Year 9 students visiting the Space Centre.

This half term, we have been working on our Improvement Plan for the next 3 years. This includes planning for further improvements in our facilities, resources, interventions, recruitment, and student support, so that we can ensure all students are in an inspiring school, taught by great teachers and able to progress. Thank you to all the parents who completed the survey asking for your input. I know

parents will also be pleased to hear that, responding to feedback, we will be further enhancing our food offer at lunchtime and, with immediate effect after Easter, lengthening lunchtime on Wednesdays by 15 minutes, without losing any vital lesson time and without changing the start or end of the day. #### **Events**

#### **Science Fortnight**

Science Fortnight 2023 involved many exciting activities taking place through all key stages involving trips and external visitors. This ran from March 13th-March 24th.

We were delighted to welcome Cambridge Science Centre back into SWCHS to deliver an interactive show to Year 7 and 8 students. Students were taken on a journey through the universe to explore how light is used to make exciting discoveries.

All of Year 9 enjoyed a day at the National Space Centre in Leicester. A highlight of the day was a live show in the 3D dome-shaped planetarium where fantastic narration by the Space Centre team along with incredible visual effects transported Year 9 into deep outer space to visit other galaxies. Students visited the Rocket Tower, in which they got to see the scale of a space rocket as well as many artefacts,

including real moon rock. They also got to take themselves back in time to experience how it was in 1969 when the world was watching the first lunar landing. Space Centre staff delivered an interactive show about combusting fuels to launch rockets which, as well as containing fun demonstrations, was directly linked to work they are doing in their current chemistry topic. Students also had time to explore the many interactive galleries and exhibits throughout the centre.

All Year 12 Science students visited the Science Museum in London. They all enjoyed a 3D Imax film to transport them to either outer Space or the Arctic, and had plenty of time to explore the many sections of the museum.

The second annual Tim Hardingham Memorial Lecture day was an exciting day for many. Two visitors from the British Antarctic Survey visited the school for the day. These scientists work in a team that collect samples of ice from Antarctica and analyse tiny bubbles within them in labs in Cambridge. Their research is at the forefront of climate change research. They had lunch with a number of Year 12 students interested in finding out about this type of career and the students involved were hugely inspired but their work and talked excitedly to the researchers. The whole of Year 10 then had a talk by the scientists about how their work encompasses biology, chemistry and physics and involves a huge range or activities and skill sets. Straight after this, they spent time with some Year 13 students who are planning to pursue a related course or career. In the evening, the researchers had a captivated audience of around 300, including students and their families and members of the public of all ages. Their lecture was inspiring to all - Saffron Hall was buzzing with excitement and questions. Being able to handle Antarctic Ice was a great highlight. It was particularly exciting that both researchers were young, female scientists who were so passionate about their subject and their careers that this will undoubtedly challenge any remaining gender stereotypes about who can be a scientist!

This was a fabulous week celebrating Science.....time to start planning for 2024!!

We have just enjoyed the most wonderful concert A Musical Mythology. Students shared a beautifully intimate & charming performance, thank you for joining us this evening








#### **SWCHS Variety Show**


# Spotlight on . . .










# Congratulations

Alumni student, Jack Stanton-Stock won a bronze medal in the recent Arena Games triathlon series. Congratulations!




