Jack Petchy Speak Out Challenge

SWCHS students have just taken part in the Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge – a programme managed and delivered by Speakers Trust, the UK's leading public speaking organisation. The aim is to amplify young people's voices by building confidence, developing skills and creating platforms for young people to share their stories and ideas to empower not only themselves but each other.

Our involvement started with a workshop in March in which 24 Year 10 students participated. They took part in a series of learning sessions delivered by a professional speech coach and were encouraged to plan, produce and deliver an engaging and well-structured speech on a topic of their choice. From this workshop, two SWCHS students were chosen to participate in the North Essex Regional Final which took place on 27 April. SWCHS students competed against students from a number of other schools in the region, providing an opportunity for everyone in the community to come together to celebrate and

build a platform for young voices. Layla Mone spoke passionately about how song writing had enabled her to find self-assurance in a speech named 'The Confident One' and Oliwia Szczepaniak delivered a powerful speech talking about the importance of embracing change in a presentation entitled 'Love the Butterflies'. Oliwia was the runner-up in the final – a wonderful accolade! Both students performed amazingly and SWCHS is very proud of their incredible achievement.

Spotlight on . . . Computer Science

Computer Science – Literacy Focus

In Computer Science this year we have been focussing on improving literacy and the use of keywords in Computing lessons. We have introduced a range of resources this year which we hope will help to embed the correct terminology and give pupils the opportunity to learn new words which are relevant to our subject, including those outside of our curriculum. Correct technical terminology is essential for progression in Computer Science and for success in exams at the end of our courses. By incorporating a variety of opportunities to learn and use a range of vocabulary we hope that this will become second nature for our students.



Reading Resource for Years 7 and 8

This has proved a lovely resource that gives pupils a chance to read articles relating to the topic that we are learning. It has provided classes with some lovely discussion points and questions that arise from

reading. We have used the material in a number of ways, sharing the reading between pupils and teachers. This gives pupils the opportunity to read out to others and practice their pronunciation.



Puzzles with keywords

Crosswords, anagrams, wordsearches are examples of short activities that we use at the start of a lesson while pupils are registering and getting settled. This gives them an opportunity to focus on literacy in a fun way.



Glossaries

We have started using Glossary sheets at KS3 to record the keywords and their meanings. This has been well received by students and has been found to be very useful when revising for topic tests. We will be expanding the use of this to KS4 and KS5 students from September.

Safeguarding Update:

Vaping

Vaping among teens has recently skyrocketed, as a school we cover the dangers in our RPHE lessons but vaping is a problem and we would urge you to speak to your young people about it.

Below are some extracts from a recent article in the times with some concerning facts.

The Times article on vaping

Vapes confiscated from children at a secondary school had more than twice the safe level of lead and more than nine times that of nickel.

The investigation also found that some devices had more than ten times the legal level of carbonyls, compounds in the e-liquid that break down when heated.

Exposure to high levels of lead can affect development of the brain and the central nervous system, according to the World Health Organisation. It is illegal to <u>sell vapes to under-18s</u> in the UK but a YouGov survey from last month showed that 11.6 per cent of 11 to 17-year-olds had experimented with the products, which contain nicotine.

The laboratory found that most of the vapes from the college were illegal and had not been tested before sale.

David Lawson, who co-founded the laboratory, which analyses vapes to ensure regulatory standards are met, said: "In 15 years I have never seen lead in a device. None of these should be on the market — they break all the rules on permitted levels of metal. They are the worst set of results I've ever seen."

It had been thought that exposure to dangerous amounts of the metals originated from the heating element in vapes but Lawson's tests showed that they were also present in the e-liquid.

For lead it was 2.4 times the safe level and for chromium it was 6.6 times.

In "highlighter vapes" — so-called because of the bright colours that make them look like highlighter pens — 9.6 times the safe level of nickel was found. For lead it was 2.4 times the safe level and for chromium it was 6.6 times. Some vapes had levels of carbonyls that exceeded cigarettes.

Chemicals including formaldehyde and acetaldehyde are produced when carbonyls in the e-liquid are heated by vapes.

Manufacturers have to follow regulations on ingredients, packaging and marketing, and e-liquids are supposed to be registered with the Medicine and Health Care Products Regulatory Agency. However, the agency is not required to check claims made in the paperwork it receives from makers and has no power to investigate unregistered products.

Lawson said there had been a rise in illegal products that were hard to distinguish from legal ones.

Dr Penelope Toff, of the British Medical Association, said "These products, designed in bold, bright colours and flavoured like sweets, are clearly being marketed at young people and it is high time we recognised their inherent dangers".
