



A-LEVEL SOCIOLOGY

WHAT IS THE COURSE ABOUT?

During the two-year course you will investigate human societies today, and study differences between cultures over time. We will look at four key areas: Family and Households, Education, Crime & Deviance, and Beliefs, as well as the cross-cutting topics of gender, social class, ethnicity, sociological theories and research methods.

HOW IS THE COURSE STRUCTURED?

PAPER 1 - Education with Theory and Methods

- 2 hour written exam
- 80 marks
- 33.3% of A-level

Education: short answer and extended writing, 50 marks

Methods in Context: extended writing, 20 marks

Theory and Methods: extended writing, 10 marks

PAPER 2 - Topics in Sociology

- 2 hour written exam
- 80 marks
- 33.3% of A-level

Section A: extended writing, 40 marks – FAMILIES AND HOUSEHOLDS

Section B: extended writing, 40 marks – BELIEFS IN SOCIETY

PAPER 3 - Crime and Deviance with Theory and Methods

- 2 hour written exam
- 80 marks
- 33.3% of A-level

Crime and Deviance: short answer and extended writing, 50 marks

Theory and Methods: extended writing, 30 marks

WHAT DO I NEED TO KNOW BEFORE TAKING THE COURSE?

You do not need to have studied Sociology at GCSE, although if you have then you can use the knowledge you have gained as a foundation to the A-Level material. It is important to be interested in society and issues such as gender, ethnicity and social class differences. It will also help if you take an interest in current affairs.

You need a 5 in GCSE English or a HUMANITIES subject in order to study Sociology.
