<p>Tag 1</p>  <p>Listen to the current Clip of Month and read about the artist: Which other German artists do you already know? See if you can find some German music on Spotify / YouTube and make a playlist. Music - Step into German - Goethe-Institut</p>	<p>Tag 2</p>  <p>Have you heard of Oktoberfest? Research what this festival is and see if you can find out what is (or is not!) happening this year. A good starting point...https://www.dw.com/en/oktoberfest/t-17452936</p>	<p>Tag 3</p>  <p>Use the following Quizlet link to revise and expand your set of core German verbs: https://quizlet.com/129343448/german-common-verbs-flash-cards/</p>	<p>Tag 4</p>  <p>Watch the news in German! Start by watching news for children. It is shorter/simpler to follow. Jot down some key stories you hear. logo! - die Kindernachrichten des ZDF - logo!</p>
<p>Tag 5</p>  <p>Explore the fantastic Grimm Grammar website – On this website German grammar is taught through the medium of the Grimm Brothers’ Fairy Stories. Lots of the grammar here will be covered as part of the course, but have an explore and see if there is something you can work on: https://coerll.utexas.edu/gg/index.html</p>	<p>Tag 6</p>  <p>Have a go at watching a German film or TV series (Netflix is great for this if you have it!). Some ideas:</p> <p>die Welle der Tunnel Almanya die Fetten Jahre sind vorbei das Leben der Anderen Goodbye, Lenin! Dark (Netflix series) The Staff Room (Der Lehrerzimmer) The Empress</p> <p>Change your viewer profile into ‘German’ then you can just watch your favourite show dubbed into German, this is better than nothing for your listening skills (and a good confidence building starting point!)</p>	<p>Tag 7</p>  <p>Read the following article about Oktoberfest Wieszeit - Deutschstunde Portal - Goethe-Institut</p> <p>Scroll down to the downloads and open the ‘Arbeitsblatt’ and complete the questions about the text.</p>	<p>Tag 8</p>  <p>Click on https://lyricstraining.com/de/play/namika/hellwach/HPTX6w08CP#b7c and have a go at filling in the gaps as you listen. (Start with beginners’ level and work your way up! – beginners’ level on choice mode is a good challenge so don’t worry too much if about the levels!)</p>

<p>Tag 9</p>  <p>Research the geography of Germany – look at a map and identify the main cities, then look at where Germany’s main mountains, rivers, coast and other geographical features are. Then do the same for Austria and Switzerland. What do you notice in comparison with the UK? (A good task for any geographers out there, too!)</p>	<p>Tag 10</p>  <p>Click on https://quizlet.com/_1j190u?x=1jq&i=2o1fc and study this Quizlet set to develop opinion phrases</p>	<p>Tag 11</p>  <p>Today’s news show is from WDR’s KiRAKA radio/news website: Nachrichten - Nachrichten - neuneinhalb - TV - Kinder Summarise 2-3 stories you hear.</p>	<p>Tag 12</p>  <p>Click on https://www.languagesonline.org.uk/Hotpotatoes/germanindex.html#Grammar and complete the top 8 sections (or as many as you can/fancy!)</p>
<p>Tag 13</p>  <p>Deutsche Welle is a fantastic resource for A level students, with videos in over 30 languages. This means you can watch the same video in English and German. Have a look at the Kultur videos and pick something that interests you to watch (clips tend to be up to one hour, but some shorter). Use this website to read about different German food specialities and see if you can have a go at making one! Deutsche Küche: Eine kulinarische Deutschlandreise</p>	<p>Tag 15</p>  <p>Have a look at the lovely Slow German podcast by Annik Rubens. She covers a range of topics and reads her blog entries slowly and clearly, with the transcripts available for free online. The Bundesliga (football) is famous world wide, but Germany does well at other sports too. Research <i>either</i> the Bundesliga <i>or</i> another sport of your choice.</p>
<p>Tag 17</p>  <p>Do you know your sein past tense verbs?
